Further Education


Further Education includes study you do after leaving school at 16 or 18.


There are courses and apprenticeships at all levels.

There are lots of Further Education courses at colleges. These can make up three days a week. You could combine it with part-time work or other activities. Courses can be on school subjects (academic) or linked to careers (vocational / technical).

What different kinds of places could I go to after Paces?

There are two types of funding you might use to pay for things you do after leaving school: **Education**, for learning and qualifications, and **Social Care**, which is there to support people with disabilities in their daily lives. You might be able to use both types of funding. Example: going to college three days a week and to a social care provider two days a week. Your EHCP may help you get funding for two years education at college or even up to the age of 25.

Specialist Colleges







Specialist colleges offer education for young people with SEND. They may focus on a particular area like art, drama or animal care or offer a wide range of options

Some of these colleges are residential so you can live there while you study.

Workplaces: Supported Internships and Apprenticeships

- A supported internship is for 16-24 year olds.
- It can last between 6 and 12 months.
- You spend most of the time at a workplace doing a job, and the rest of the time at a school or college. You learn work based skills that you can use in the future.
- Your job coach will help you.

Apprenticeships are offered at different levels. You usually spend 4 days a week with your employer and a day a week in college learning. You are paid and can gain a qualification.



Social Care

These include beekeeping, looking after chickens, growing a wide range of plants and produce, landscaping and garden maintenance.


